# **Players**

### **Through the Ages**

#### Top five oldest players of the participating teams

At the age of nearly 45, Egyptian goalkeeper ESSAM ELHADARY could replace Colombian counterpart Faryd MONDRAGON as the oldest player in FIFA World Cup<sup>TM</sup> history. MONDRAGON took to the field four years ago in Brazil aged 43 years and three days. ESSAM ELHADARY is even older than three of the coaches participating in Russia, namely Senegalese tactician Aliou CISSE, Serbian Mladen KRSTAJIC and Spaniard Roberto MARTINEZ, who is calling the shots for Belgium. In addition, Mexico's Rafael MARQUEZ could earn himself a place just outside the all-time top ten.

#### Top five youngest players of the participating teams

Australian Daniel ARZANI is the youngest player participating in the 2018 World Cup at the age of 19 and a half, followed by Frenchman Kylian MBAPPE, who is just over two weeks older. Also among the five youngest players involved in this edition are Moroccan Achraf HAKIMI, Nigeria's Francis UZOHO and England's Trent ALEXANDER-ARNOLD, who are all under 20 years old.

#### **Familiar Faces**

#### Players who played in previous FIFA World Cups

A total of 200 players have been squad members in at least one previous World Cup and 176 have actually played in the competition. In particular, 186 players were involved in Brazil 2014, 61 in South Africa 2010, 21 in Germany 2006 and one player, Mexico's Rafael MARQUEZ, also took part in the 2002 edition in Korea Republic and Japan.

If fielded, MARQUEZ will become the third player to see action in five editions, following his compatriot Antonio CARBAJAL and Germany's Lothar MATTHAUS.

By contrast, eight players could take to the field in their fourth World Cup: Argentina's Javier MASCHERANO and Lionel MESSI, Australia's Tim CAHILL, Mexican Andres GUARDADO, Portugal's Cristiano RONALDO, Spaniards Andres INIESTA and Sergio RAMOS and Switzerland's Valon BEHRAMI.

Two players are making their return to the World Cup after a 12-year absence, namely Randall AZOFEIFA (1 game for Costa Rica in 2006) and Lukasz FABIANSKI, who was with Poland's squad in Germany but did not play.

Among the players rostered for the 2018 finals, Javier MASCHERANO and Rafael MARQUEZ have played the most World Cup matches, with 16, one more than Lionel MESSI and two ahead of Mesut ÖZIL on 14. Behind them on 13 are Cristiano RONALDO, Thomas MULLER, Manuel NEUER and Sergio RAMOS.

By contrast, 53 players have scored at least one goal in the World Cup. The top scorer among those present in Russia is Germany's Thomas MULLER with ten, followed by Colombia's James RODRIGUEZ with six and the quartet of Tim CAHILL, Gonzalo HIGUAIN, Lionel MESSI and Luis SUAREZ on five.

#### Former winners out in force

A total of 15 world champions are participating in Russia, consisting of six Spaniards and nine Germans. The 2010 title winners are Sergio BUSQUETS, Andres INIESTA, Gerard PIQUE, Sergio RAMOS, Pepe REINA and David SILVA, while the 2014 victors are Jerome BOATENG, Julian DRAXLER, Matthias GINTER, Mats HUMMELS, Sami KHEDIRA, Toni KROOS, Thomas MULLER, Manuel NEUER and Mesut ÖZIL.

#### National team appearances and goals

(as of 4 June 2018)

Of the players participating in Russia, 35 have accumulated at least 100 caps for their national team. Top of the pile is Egyptian goalkeeper ESSAM ELHADARY with 157, followed by Spain's Sergio RAMOS with 151 and Portugal's Cristiano RONALDO with 149.

Twenty players are yet to win their first international cap.

Among players in Russia who are their country's leading marksman, Cristiano RONALDO leads the pack with 81 goals, followed by Lionel MESSI with 61 and Brazil's NEYMAR on 53.



#### **Coming through the ranks**

Among the finalists in Russia, 60 players representing eight different teams have already won a FIFA tournament other than the World Cup. The earliest such honour was the FIFA Confederations Cup title won by Rafael MARQUEZ in 1999.

# Coaches

### Top five oldest coaches of the participating teams

Uruguayan Oscar TABAREZ will become the second-oldest coach in World Cup history, second only to German supremo Otto REHHAGEL, who guided Greece at the 2010 edition aged 71 years and 317 days. Also entering the all-time top ten will be Argentinian Jose PEKERMAN, who is leading Colombia in Russia and occupies fourth place, behind Cesare MALDINI and ahead of Otto PFISTER.

## **Number of players in domestic leagues**

Only 27% of the players represent domestic clubs (199 out of 736). England is the only team in which all the players play club football on home soil, followed by Russia (21 out of 23) and Saudi Arabia (20 out of 23). By contrast, no members of the Senegal or Sweden squads play their trade at home and four squads (Belgium, Iceland, Nigeria and Switzerland) have only one player who plays in his native country.
